The Lotus Effect (Part 2)

Firstly, apologies to all of you (?!) who were waiting with bated breath for the continuation of this saga last month; an imminent house move sort of took over! What, with no 'East Emmerdale Street' as well it must have been tragic for you all!

So, when we left off a couple of months ago, it was three Lotus' down and I had just traded the last one in for something even more expensive and troublesome: this being a house of course!

A lot was happening around this time, (1983) including plans to build a new shop. I had decided that the only way to afford another Lotus was to grow the business, so that meant a bigger sales area. I went cap in hand to the bank to ask for a loan, and one of the questions was 'why do want to build this new shop?', so I told him the truth, 'I want another Lotus, and the only way I'm going to get one is by earning more money'. Fortunately, the bank manager thought that was an excellent reason and approved the loan!

After a three-year battle with the planners, which ended up with the House of Commons involved, I finally had my new shop, and the first thing that went up was my 'Lotus count-down calendar', with a target of three years. I was really lucky, as the opening coincided with the time when the banks were throwing money at people, and things went very well; so well in fact that after two years I decided it was time to order my first new Lotus; the Peter Stevens designed Esprit Turbo.

I decided it would be a nice surprise for Alice if I didn't tell her, so I had five months on tenterhooks, trying to not let anything slip, while the car was being built. I thought I would go the whole hog and arranged to have the car delivered to Hambleton Hall Hotel, near Rutland Water. So

the first thing Alice knew was when she found a note in the bread bin, requesting she be ready to leave by 6.30 that evening. When we rolled up at Hambleton she didn't know whether to thank me or kill me, as she hadn't prepared for somewhere that swanky. (My 'surprises' usually involve the recycling centre or a trip to a wet and cold Snetterton!)

Redemption was at hand when she found a new outfit in our room's wardrobe, which just happened to be her size! After partaking of good food and wine we retired to bed, where I think Alice maybe slept more than I did! My cover was nearly blown the next morning, as Alice spotted the car coming down the stairs. Luckily, as she hadn't seen the new-model Esprit before, she mistook it for a Ferrari! I think 'gobsmacked' would probably describe Alice's reaction when the car was handed over to me: it took three days to convince her that I had bought it and it was not just on loan!



This new model was a big improvement on the old one; it rode like a luxury saloon and yet the handling was still pure Lotus brilliance. But the biggest change was in overall refinement; this really was a car for crossing continents in now, which we did on several occasions.

All was well until a phone call from Pat Thomas of Kelvedon Motors, who just happened to have one of the new 'SE' models on demo. Like a fool I went to try it, and boy was it fast. Really fast! Power was up from 210bhp to 264, courtesy of a chargecooler, and torque from 199lb ft to 260. This may not sound a lot by today's standards, but you have to remember it was only shifting 1,300kg, so 0-60 only took 4.7s - not too shabby by today's standards and proper quick in 1990. The temptation was too strong and, in 1991, I took

The temptation was too strong and, in 1991, I took delivery of what was going to be my last, and best,



Esprit. We had four terrific years with the car, but as work and gardening seemed to demand more of my time it seemed a waste to have all that investment only being used on high days and holidays.

The solution provided itself in the shape of the Elise. This was one of Lotus' worst kept secrets, so

when they denied any such car was imminent, I told them that I would place my order anyway, and then when they did decide it existed, I would be at the front of the queue!

The Esprit was put up for sale, and fetched such a good price that there was quite a lump of cash over after allowing for the Elise. The sensible thing would have been to pay off some of the mortgage, but the money would also buy a trip out to New York on Concorde and a return on the QE2. Unusually for us we went with the irresponsible option; best money we have ever spent!

Unfortunately, the gestation of the Elise was about on a par with that of an elephant! I should have taken delivery in May, but eventually received my car on September 9th 1996!

It really was a case of whether they would get the car to market before the receivers moved in; Lotus have always operated in a perpetual cash crisis, but this was bad even for them. My anticipation was heightened the week before delivery, when were sat on the next table to a journalist at Brands Hatch, who had an Elise on road test. I asked him if all the hype about the Elise was true and he simply replied 'It's the best fun you'll ever have with your trousers on', and I don't think I could put it any better.

So here we are 24 years down the road and I still love my Elise, and the more digital and detached modern cars become, the more I love it!

I think this one will stay until either I am too ancient to get in it, (not an easy job with the roof on now!) or the rule makers hound it off the road.

As an aside, the aforementioned house move prompted me to donate my 40 plus years of Lotus memorabilia to their archives, and in return they provided me with a 'certificate of provenance' for the Elise. It appears my girl was the 70th customer car built, and the first and only one in Ruby Red during that model year, so she's a bit special!

And so, my saga ends. Next month: some of the most interesting underpants I've owned!!
