Another Anniversary Treat For Alice!

After the success of last-year's anniversary trip to the car museum at Caistor Castle, I thought I had better keep the tradition going with a visit to the Manoir de L'Automobile at Loheac, France.

When I heard the name 'Loheac', I knew it rang a bell, and it transpired that it was because as well as the museum, the venue is also home to the Loheac Rallycross Circuit, which sometimes hosts the French round of the World Rallycross Championship, and as a bonus when we visited, they were preparing for a round of the European Championship, so we got to see the Rallycross cars as well as the museum: result!





The museum itself is utterly astounding, with over 400 exhibits, which not only include cars from all eras, but power boats, engines and the most amazing collection of models I have ever seen; literally thousands of them, covering everything from military to Formula 1.

The dioramas that displayed some of them were true works of art; someone must have had a lot of patience!

I think I counted 18 Formula 1 cars, displayed together with a vast collection of memorabilia, from bodywork to seemingly unused gear sets. You could spend half a day just in this section, but we had a time schedule to keep to, so had to limit ourselves a bit.

As far as we could make out, the museum, like the one at Caistor, is the realisation of one man's passion, and boy, must he have deep pockets, as there were whole sections of Maseratis, Lamborghinis, Ferraris...you name it and he had got a shed load of them!

I think rather than taking up a lot of space with my rambling, I will just let the pictures do the talking, but if ever you do get the chance to visit the museum, you will not be disappointed;



and as a bonus, it is not far from Le Mans, so you could do a combined trip.

The only disappointment: only two Lotus (unless you count the Lotus Cortina and Lotus Sunbeam!) and one of them was an M100 Elan: not the greatest example of the marque!

This article first appeared in Newsletter no. 128 in February 2019 but is reproduced, with minor edits to update it, for the information of some of our newer members...

It would seem with age, nostalgia becomes more powerful as when you reach a certain age there is more behind than in front. It is probably only natural. After attending our AGM, Nigel Mann and I started reminiscing, as two sad old gits are prone to do. With the election of Joy Mann as the first female chairperson back in 2019 she was, we think, the 9th person to hold this illustrious position. **East Elloe Motor Club** was formed in 1973 after an advert was put in the local paper by a certain Jim Issitt and an inaugural meeting was held in the now demolished Lamb & Flag pub in Whaplode. A committee was formed and Jim was elected as chairman but, despite his initial enthusiasm, he very quickly faded away and I was elected as Chairman with Sue, my then bride-to- be, taking on the job of club secretary. Sue continued until our son Robert was born in 1979 and Carol Modd took on the role then (of secretary - not bride!!).

I continued as Chairman until the club became a limited company in late 1984 at which point I stood down and Peter Burnett took over, with Patrick Limming (also still a member) as Vice Chairman. From Peter, we moved to Brian Barrs who took us into the 90's. During this time, road rallying was becoming a little anti-social and at one AGM the club looked as if it had run its course. But an attempt to revive the club was then organised; a meeting was held at Nigel Mann's house and somehow I was re-elected as Chairman and the club staggered on. I'm unsure how long I remained Chairman but we eventually persuaded Nigel to take over. He handed the baton to another stalwart of the club, Simon Leonard, who was our leader for several years. This period overlapped with the start up of the SEECCC 'brand' in 2008; Simon was duly succeeded by Adrian Cunnington who was chair before Joy took over.

For those who've joined the club under the SEECCC banner to enjoy "classic cars", most of this will mean very little, but over the last 52 years there have been far too many people involved to mention them all, but all have done something to keep the club 'alive', along with the Pollard family, Carol Modd, Karen Barrs, Alan Lyon and, of course, the many wives of Nigel Mann!! I think David Goose and me are the only originals but we are both still actively involved in competing, David having returned to rallying after a short layoff of about 30 years! A special mention should go to Adrian who I think fairly single-handedly changed the club into the vibrant and successful form we now enjoy, whilst in his spare time continues to edit the monthly newsletter! As a further aside, the first EEMC classic car event was back in 1998 (when 24 vehicles took part - 22 cars plus a Morris Minor van and a Land Rover Series One) – meagre beginnings for what is now SEECCC's flagship Annual Run every June.

Over those years, we also ran three stage rallies which were very successful. The first was run on local farm roads and this was largely down to Keith Ream (another still a member!) who, in his job as a potato merchant, knew every decent private road in the area. This was followed by two events on the Showground at Peterborough run by Tony Gillett that were also a success, but unfortunately the showground owners then decided that they no longer wanted rallying on their patch.

Various gala dinners along the way took place at venues as varied as the Barn at Sutton Bridge; Springfields; Anglia Motel and Whaplode Manor, with guest speakers from the world of motorsport. To name a few: Brian Culcheth (BL works driver); Phil Short and Mike Broad (International rally codrivers) John Taylor from Ford and Alec Stokes ex-BRM. We also dabbled in karting but members' (lightweight) sons always won that, so it didn't take off much! Of course, road rallying was how we started and although there are lots of stories perhaps most of them are best left untold and it is now mostly in the past. But the Club continues to flourish in its current form and having celebrated 50 years of EEMC in 2023, we continue to enjoy happy motoring!
